

# Ways to Raise a Reader

# PLAY

Pre-readers learn about the world through play, which helps in understanding stories

Take a trip around your neighbourhood as if it is your first time there. Have your child describe everything they notice with all their senses.



## TALK

Pre-readers learn about language by listening or watching you talk and joining in the conversation

Imagine you are taking a trip together. Talk about where you would go. What would you do there? What might you eat? What kinds of animals or plants might you see?





Singing together increases awareness of the sounds of words

Turn a daily activity into a song. Stretch out the words and use silly voices or sound effects.



## WRITE

Writing helps pre-readers learn that letters and words stand for sounds and that printed text has meaning

Encourage your child to "write" a letter to a friend or favourite character by drawing and scribbling.

Print their name at the end of the letter and let them try copying it.

# READ


Shared reading is the most effective way to help children become good readers



Judge a book by its cover! Have your child guess what a book is about from its cover and then read it together to find out.



Did you know that listening to audiobooks helps build literacy skills? Library staff can help you find books in accessible formats, like audiobooks, e-books, braille and printbraille picture books. For a selection of summer reads, visit celalibrary.ca.

Read a book with an animal character

Read a joke together


Use a silly character voice while reading a picture book

Read a book with some type of vehicle in it




Use these pages in any way you like! Here are a few ideas: list books or other material that you and your child have read or listened to together. Create pictures inspired by books, songs and more.
